Every Barren Woman in Scripture who receives a child as a gift — Sarah, Hannah, Elizabeth, Mary — is an echo of this first hiddenness. The child does not come from nowhere. It comes from what was always already there, waiting for its moment.

Isaac was named for Sarah's laughter. Perhaps her laughter was the sound of recognition — that the stars had been telling her story since Day 4, and here at last was the child they promised, yet something just too good to be believed.
